Rachel's story

I didn't get on with my mum, I hated my stepfather. I knew I had to get out and one day I left. I stayed with mates on sofas but sometimes it was difficult so I ended up on the streets. I got in touch with social services but they did nothing so then I rang NYAS. They listened to me and got social services to help me.

Tom's story

Tom aged 11 was placed in a children's home because of abuse and neglect. He wanted somewhere safe to store keepsakes from his grandparents which could never be replaced. He was worried that they would be stolen or destroyed by other children. A NYAS advocate regularly visited the children's home where Tom lived. He noticed that Tom was new and took time to introduce himself to Tom and to explain his role. Tom was able to talk to the NYAS advocate about his worries.

NYAS helped Tom to discuss his worries with the staff at the home and they agreed to address Tom's concerns. Tom's belongings are now stored safely and he has access to them whenever he wants them.



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
